PERFORMANCE RECORD

This fund feeds into United-*i* Global Balanced Fund -MYR hedge Class ("target fund") with the objective to provide income and capital appreciation over the medium to long term by investing in Shariah-compliant equities and Sukuk globally.

FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Equity

Weak selection in information technology and industrials was partially offset by selection in consumer staples, communication services and health care. On a regional basis, weak stock selection in Japan and United Kingdom was partially offset by selection in Developed EU & Middle East ex UK. Within consumer staples and communication services, our top relative contributors were not owning Nestlé and an overweight to Meta Platforms, respectively. Within information technology and industrials, our top relative detractors were an underweight to NVIDIA and an overweight to Daikin Industries, respectively. Shares of Nestle, a Switzerland-based global food and beverage producer, fell over the period. The company reported full-year results for 2023 which showed total sales falling 1.5% from 2022 and organic growth reaching 7.2%. Management expects their organic sales growth to be around 4% in 2024 and a moderate increase in the underlying trading operating profit margin. Shares of NVIDIA rose over the period after the chipmaker delivered a first-quarter sales forecast well above consensus estimates, citing strong AI compute and networking demand. The company also reported fourth-quarter revenue and earnings above expectations, driven by its datacenter performance. Management noted that demand for its newest products will continue to outstrip its growing supply for the rest of the year.

Sukuk

The sukuk sleeves outperform its benchmark by 12bps (Sukuk return: -0.17 vs Benchmark: -0.29), driven by industrial sector. Contributor of the fund was DIB Sukuk, while detractor of fund was RAK capital.

There may be opportunity loss to the target fund due to the target fund not being allowed to retain the excess gains derived from the disposal of the Shariah non-compliant securities. In the event the Shariah non-compliant securities are disposed at a price lower than the investment cost, it may adversely affect the value of the target fund. Thus, it may cause the NAV of the target fund to fall.

Interest Rate Risk	Interest rate risk refers to the impact of interest rate changes on the valuation of Sukuk and/or Islamic money market instruments. When interest rates rise, Sukuk and/or Islamic money market instruments prices generally decline and this may lower the market value of the target fund's investment in Sukuk and/or Islamic money market instruments. The reverse may apply when interest rates fall. Meanwhile, Sukuk and/or Islamic money market instruments with longer maturities and lower profit rates are more sensitive to interest rate changes.

Equity Risk

As the target fund will be investing in Shariah-compliant equities, the target fund will be affected by equity risk. Generally, equity risk may arise in the following forms, i.e., equity risks related to external factors and equity risks related to company-specific factors. All of these related equity risks can adversely affect the prices of equities, which would negatively impact the performance of the target fund.

Country Risk

The target fund is also subject to country risk. The value of the assets of the target fund may also be affected by the economic and political climate, restriction on currency repatriation or other developments in the law or regulations of the countries in which the target fund may invest in. Further, when investing in foreign markets, there are countries which may require prior approvals before investments can take place.
