## FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

In October, the fund rose +2.77% in MYR terms, outperforming the benchmark by 247bps. Year-to-date the Fund rose 6.28%, outperforming the Benchmark by 5.45bps. The outperformance of the month was driven by industrials, financials and telecommunications.

The FTSE Bursa Malaysia Composite Index ("KLCI") fell -2.37% as we saw a resurgence in covid19 cases and rising political uncertainty. Energy -9.9% Construction -5.7% and REIT -4.7% were the worst performing sectors in October, while the best performing sectors were Technology +8.4% and Healthcare +7.1%. Despite our cheap valuations locally, we reiterated our cautiousness view on the local market perspective driven by the resurgence of Covid cases globally and domestically. Earlier hope for rapid recovery in 4Q2020 may now be pushed further into 1Q or 2Q of 2021. Heighten volatility in the coming months present a good opportunity to position all portfolios for 1H2021. Sector in focus are Technology, Healthcare, Telecommunication and Commodity-related.

Asia: While the number of new infections is still increasing globally, we maintain our view that the global economy should continue its recovery over the next 12 months. We have seen signs of peaking in number of new cases in Asia, such as India and Indonesia. Any positive newsflow around vaccine availability would help array market concerns. Meanwhile, monetary and fiscal policies should remain supportive. Hence, the ample liquidity will be a tailwind for Asian equities in the next 12 months.

We rate Asian equities a BUY over a 12-month horizon. We remain positive on China and the more developed Asian economies. We are also starting to increase exposure to emerging markets such as Indonesia and India as growth broadens out. Sector wise, the preference has been for cyclical or economic sensitive sectors such as industrial, materials and financials. Our focus continues to be on companies that benefit from structural growth drivers such as internet platforms, datacentres, electrification of vehicles and quality companies which are long-term winners with significant brand equity or are market share gainers.
