PERFORMANCE RECORD

This fund feeds into Affin Hwang AiMAN Select Income Fund ("target fund") with the objective to provide investors with regular income stream through Shariah-compliant investments. The target fund will invest in a diversified portfolio of Sukuks, Shariah-compliant equities and Islamic money market instruments.

FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

- The MSCI Asia ex-Japan index rose 3.7% in December as recovery takes hold in the region. The Asian index posted gains of 20.4% in 2020.
- The local market tracked regional gains with the benchmark KLCI closing 1.6% higher. The index closed the year up 2.4% buoyed by a liquidity-driven rally as lower interest rates boost risk appetite.
- The local bond market started the month on a negative footing with investors cutting risk amidst concerns over the impact of EPF upsizing its i-Sinar programme. Nonetheless, EPF expects the additional outflow from withdrawals to have a minimal impact on long-term return and is prepared having increased its cash levels when Covid-19 hit in early last year.
- The local market saw a mild knee-jerk reaction after Fitch Ratings downgraded Malaysia's long-term foreign-currency issuer default rating (IDR) to 'BBB+' with a stable outlook.
- Investors shrugged off the rating action and selling pressure tapered after the final auction for the year drew strong interest. The pick-up in demand was expected as valuations turned attractive.
- **STRATEGY:** The Fund targets a neutral to slightly long duration with preference for primary corporate bond issuances to deploy cash.
- We have a trading stance for government bonds and will look for opportunities to buy on dips.
- The fund reduced fixed income exposure to around 55%, while equity exposure was also maintained at around 39%.
- Global central banks are expected to maintain their accommodative stance. Our base case is for the OPR to stay at 1.75% for the remainder of the year. However, BNM has the policy space to maneuver should data disappoint due to the still high level of uncertainty and on the backdrop of low inflation.
- We anticipate foreign inflows to remain positive on the back of attractive yields and the strengthening MYR. Demand for bonds from investors who are looking for a yield pick-up vs the current low deposit rates should remain healthy.
- The large government bond supply profile will weigh on MYR bonds while demand faces headwinds with various stimulus measures affecting the cash flow of EPF, which usually provides support to local markets. However, we believe concerns over the impact of withdrawals from EPF are overblown with historical take up rates lower than expected.

Manager's Risk	<p>This risk refers to the day-to-day management of the target fund by Affin Hwang which will impact the performance of the target fund. Inflation Risk	<p>This is the risk that your investment in the target fund may not grow or generate income at a rate that keeps pace with inflation. This would reduce your purchasing power even though the value of the investment in monetary terms has increased.</p>
Credit/Default risk	<p>Credit risk relates to the creditworthiness of the issuers of the investment (Sukuk and Islamic money markets instruments) and their expected ability to make timely payment of profit and/or principal. Any adverse situations faced by the issuers may impact the value as well as liquidity of the investment. In the case of rated investments, this may lead to a credit downgrade. Default risk relates to the risk of an issuer of the investment either defaulting on payments or failing to make payments in a timely manner which will in turn adversely affect the value of the investment. This could adversely affect the value of the target fund.</p>
Counterparty risk	<p>This risk concerns with the target fund's investment in Shariah-compliant derivatives where the other party in an agreement may default on the terms of the agreement. Generally, counterparty risk can be reduced by emphasis on credit analysis of the counterparty to determine its creditworthiness.</p>
Interest rate risk	<p>Interest rate risk refers to the impact of interest rate changes on the valuation of Sukuk. When interest rates rise, Sukuk's prices generally decline and this may lower the market value of the target fund's investment in Sukuk. The reverse may apply when interest rates fall. In order to mitigate interest rate risk, Affin Hwang will need to manage the debt portfolio taking into account the coupon rate and time to maturity of the Sukuk.</p> <p>Note: Interest rate is a general indicator that will have an impact on the management of the target fund regardless of whether it is a Shariah-based fund or otherwise. It does not in any way suggest that the target fund will invest in conventional financial instruments.</p>
Stock Specific Risk	<p>Prices of a particular Shariah-compliant stock may fluctuate in response to the circumstances affecting individual companies such as adverse financial performance, news of a possible merger or loss of key personnel of a company. Any adverse price movements of such Shariah-compliant stock will adversely affect the target fund's NAV.</p>
Shariah-compliant warrants investment risk	<p>The value of the Shariah-compliant warrants will depend on the pricing of the underlying security whereby the growth and performance prospect of the underlying security would consequentially affect the value of the Shariah-compliant warrants. In addition, the value of the Shariah-compliant warrants may decrease exponentially as the Shariah-compliant warrants approach their maturity date and the potential gains from a favourable price movement of the underlying security may be offset by aggressive time decay. Affin Hwang may consider unwinding these Shariah-compliant warrants if there are material adverse changes to its value with the aim to mitigate the risk.</p>

RISKS (CONTINUED)

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk arises in two scenarios. The first scenario is where an investment cannot be sold due to unavailability of a buyer for that investment. The second scenario exists where the investment, by its nature, is thinly traded. This will have the effect of causing the investment to be sold below its fair value which would adversely affect the NAV of the target fund.

Currency risk

As the investments of the target fund may be denominated in currencies other than the base currency, any fluctuation in the exchange rate between the base currency and the currencies in which the investments are denominated may have an impact on the value of these investments. You should note that any gains or losses arising from the fluctuation in the exchange rate may further increase or decrease the returns of the investment.

Regulatory risk

The investments of the target fund will be exposed to changes in the laws and regulations in the countries the target fund is invested in. These regulatory changes pose a risk to the target fund as it may materially impact the investments of the target fund. In an effort to manage and mitigate such risk, Affin Hwang seeks to continuously keep abreast of regulatory developments (for example, by closely monitoring announcements on regulators' website and mainstream medias) in that country. Affin Hwang Affin Hwang may dispose its investments in that particular country should the regulatory changes adversely impact the unit holders' interest or diminish returns to the target fund.

Country risk

Investments of the target fund in any country may be affected by changes in the economic and political climate, restriction on currency repatriation or other developments in the law or regulations of the countries in which the target fund invests in. For example, the deteriorating economic condition of such countries may adversely affect the value of the investments undertaken by the target fund in those affected countries. This in turn may cause the NAV of the target fund to fall.

Reclassification of Shariah status risk

This risk refers to the risk that the currently held Shariah-compliant equities in the target fund may be reclassified to be Shariah non-compliant in the periodic review of the equities by the Shariah Advisory Council of the Securities Commission Malaysia (SACSC), the Shariah Adviser or the Shariah boards of the relevant Islamic indices. If this occurs, Affin Hwang will take the necessary steps to dispose of such equities. There may be opportunity loss to the target fund due to the target fund not being allowed to retain the excess capital gains derived from the disposal of the Shariah non-compliant equities. Affin Hwang will be required to dispose of these equities immediately if the prices are above the purchase price. Should the prices be below the purchase price, Affin Hwang may choose to hold on to these holdings until the prices meet the purchase price. Nevertheless, should Affin Hwang decide to dispose of these equities below the purchase price, the target fund will be faced with the risk of realising its losses, thus negatively impacting the NAV of the target fund.
