FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

- The US 10-year treasury yield which touched new highs this year has stoked inflationary fears that could prompt the US Fed to start tightening, though they have since reaffirmed their dovish stance at its policy meeting in March.
- Asian credits were softer coming into March, particularly within the HY property segment, amidst the volatility in US treasury yields. However, the regional credit space recovered towards the end of the month on bargain hunting.
- The narrative from the PBoC remains in line with prior guidance, that it would continue to actively manage monetary policy with assurance of ample liquidity. There were no clear signals from the NPC of potential tightening or loosening.
- Central banks in the region including Thailand, Indonesia, and Philippines held policy rates unchanged during the month to support their reviving economies.
- The Bank of Japan unveiled a set of policy tweaks aimed at giving itself more flexibility to revive inflation. They set out a wider than expected movement range for bond yields and scrapped a buying target for stock funds.

STRATEGY: We do not expect key central banks to raise interest rates anytime soon. The economic recovery will be uneven in 2021 as vaccinations will take time and at the same time Covid-19 continues to linger.

- We expect inflation to pickup in 2021 mainly due to low base effect and supply disruptions but expect it to taper off eventually. As such, the steep rise in yields recently may not be sustained.
- We continue to like selective solid HY names, primarily Chinese properties and bank capitals that are still providing a decent buffer against the rise in yields.
- We continue to favor quality names with a tilt towards the IG segment. The breakdown of IG versus HY and unrated bonds are 60% and 14% respectively. Focus will be on credit selection with government bonds to provide liquidity and trading opportunities.
- We are taking a defensive stance given the current rising yield environment. Hence, cash levels was raised to 10% to enable us to deploy capital into papers that have become more attractive
- Duration remained at around 5.2 years with portfolio yield at 3.5%.

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Structured products risk

The NAV of the target fund will be impacted by the valuation of the structured product. Factors that may impact the valuation of the structured products will include, but not be limited to movement of the underlying assets, volatility of the underlying assets, interest rate levels, the correlation of the underlying assets and other such factors. Country risk

Investments of the target fund in any country may be affected by changes in economic and political climate, restriction on currency repatriation or other developments in the law or regulations of the countries in which the target fund invests. For example, the deteriorating economic condition of such countries may adversely affect the value of the investments undertaken by the target fund in those affected countries. This in turn may cause the NAV of the target fund or prices of units to fall.

Regulatory risk

The investments of the target fund would be exposed to changes in the laws and regulations in the countries the target fund is invested in. These regulatory changes pose a risk to the target fund as it may materially impact the investments of the target fund. In an effort to manage and mitigate such risk, the fund manager seeks to continuously keep abreast of regulatory developments (for example, by closely monitoring announcements on regulators' website and mainstream media) in that country. The fund manager may dispose its investments in that particular country should the regulatory changes adversely impact the investors' interest or diminish returns to the target fund.
