PERFORMANCE RECORD

FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

For the month, the fund declined -3.42% in MYR terms, outperforming the benchmark by +252bps. The outperformance of the month was driven by Information Technology, Health Care and Industrials.

FBMKLCI declined -8%, triggered by the high inflation data in the US and renewed fears that the Fed could over-tighten. Commodities-related stocks and Gloves languished. Bank Negara maintained GDP growth forecast of 5.3-6-3% for 2022. Headline inflation is also projected to average higher between 2.2% and 3.2%. As expected, BNM raised OPR by another 25bps to 2.25% in the latest MPC meeting. Valuation has turned more compelling following the recent sharp sell-off. At c.13.5x rolling 1Y forward PE, that is approaching -2SD below the historical mean of 16x.

We continue to adopt a balanced approach between value and growth, whilst maintaining adequate diversification. While we still overweight cyclical themes such as Consumer Discretionary. We now see good opportunity within Financials following the recent sell-off, as well Technology, particularly those with structural growth at reasonable valuation.

The MSCI AC Asia Pacific ex Japan Index fell by 6.3% in USD terms, led by Korea and Taiwan. The US 10-year bond yield rose 17bps to 3.01% during the month. Concerns over global recession and persistent inflation weighed on markets. The China Caixin Composite PMI showed improvement in June, rebounding to 55.3 from 42.2 in May. As the movement restrictions ease, we expect to see recovery in China economic activities to continue. The Chinese government is likely to implement more fiscal policies to boost the economic growth after the lockdowns. While inflation is expected to remain high in the next 3-6 months due to rising energy and food prices, we look out for peaking of inflation to be more positive on equities.

We have a slightly positive view on Asian equities. We favor adding Chinese equities as the country emerges from lockdowns coupled with economic stimulus. We will also continue to focus on quality companies which have good earnings visibility, robust balance sheet, long term winners, market share gainers and those with pricing power to overcome cost pressures.

Default risk relates to the risk that a securities issuer or counterparty either defaulting on payments or failing to make payments in a timely manner which will in turn adversely affect the value of the investments. This could adversely affect the value of the target fund. We aim to mitigate this risk by performing bottom-up and top-down credit research and analysis to determine the creditworthiness of its issuers or counterparties, and impose investment limits on exposures for issuers or counterparties with different credit profiles as a precautionary step to limit any loss that may arise directly or indirectly as a result of a defaulted transaction.
Interest rate risk	Interest rate risk refers to the impact of interest rate changes on the valuation of debt instruments and money market instruments. When interest rates rise, debt instruments and money market instruments prices generally decline and this may lower the market value of the target fund's investment in debt instruments and money market instruments. In managing the debt instruments, we take into account the coupon rate and time to maturity of the debt instruments with an aim to mitigate the interest rate risk. As for money market instruments, the typical tenor of these instruments are less than 12-month maturity and unlike debt instrument, any change to interest rate will only have a minor impact to the prices of these instruments.
Country risk	Investments of the target fund in any country may be affected by changes in the economic and political climate, restriction on currency repatriation or other developments in the law or regulations of the countries in which the target fund invests in. For example, the deteriorating economic condition of such countries may adversely affect the value of the investments undertaken by the target fund in those affected countries. This in turn may cause the NAV of the target fund or price of units to fall.

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Currency risk

As the investments of the target fund may be denominated in currencies other than the base currency of the target fund, any fluctuation in the exchange rate between the base currency of the target fund and the currencies in which the investments are denominated may have an impact on the value of these investments. You should be aware that if the currencies in which the investments are denominated depreciate against the base currency of the target fund, this will have an adverse effect on the NAV of the target fund in the base currency of the target fund and vice versa. You should note that any gains or losses arising from the fluctuation in the exchange rate may further increase or decrease the returns of the investment.

Risk of investing in emerging markets

We attempt to mitigate these risks through active asset allocation management and diversification across different countries and sectors, in addition to our continuous bottom-up and top-down research and analysis.

Risks associated with investment in warrants

The value of warrants is influenced by the current market price of the underlying security, the exercise price of the contract, the time to expiration of the contract and the estimate of the future volatility of the underlying security's price over the life of the contract. Generally, the erosion in value of warrants accelerates as it approaches its expiry date. Like securities, we will undertake fundamental research and analysis on these instruments with an aim to mitigate its risks.
