PERFORMANCE RECORD

This fund feeds into United-*i* Global Balanced Fund MYR hedged Class ("target fund") with the objective to provide income and capital appreciation over the medium to long term by investing in Shariah-compliant equities and Sukuk globally.

FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Equity

Weak selection in consumer discretionary, health care and information technology was partially offset by selection in communication services and real estate. On a regional basis, weak stock selection in North America was partially offset by selection in Developed EU & Middle East ex UK and Japan. Within communication services and real estate, our top relative contributors were overweights to Alphabet and KE Holdings, respectively. Within consumer discretionary and health care, our top relative detractors were not owning Alibaba and an overweight to Eli Lilly, respectively.

Shares of Alphabet climbed higher following Q2 results that topped consensus expectations due to revenue growth in Search and Google Cloud. A return to growth in YouTube provided additional tailwinds to the stock price. Additional factors contributing to positive market sentiment included stabilizing ad demand, potential upside driven by AI, and cost management. Shares of Alibaba rose over the period after Ant group, an affiliate of Alibaba, was fined \$985 million which sparked optimism. This fine signaled an end to a prolonged regulatory probe into the fintech giant which has weighed on Alibaba. Shares were also aided by the company's announcement that it will forgo affiliate Ant Group's \$6 billion share buyback program.

Sukuk

Despite the volatile UST, sukuk sleeves continue to outperform the benchmark and contribute positively to the fund for the month of July by 1.23% (Sukuk Return: 1.35% vs Benchmark: 0.23%). The outperformance were driven by mainly the industrial sector (Fund: 4.07 vs BM: -0.03). Names such as Penang Port (MYR) and Sarawak Petchem (MYR) contributed positively to the sukuk sleeves outperformance. The detractors meanwhile arising from our investment in Government Nationals sector (Fund: -0.09 vs BM: 0.00%).
