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FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

The Fund increased by 2.5% in March, underperforming the benchmark by 31 bps. YTD, the Fund is up 11.1%, outperforming the benchmark by 0.6%.

Developed market equities continued to perform well with S&P 500, MSCI Europe and MSCI Japan increased by 3.2%, 4.1% and 3.7% respectively, in local currency terms. Resilienteconomic data and stronger than expected inflation numbers reduced market's expectations to 2-3 cuts by the Fed in 2024. The 10-year Treasury yield increased to 4.41% at the timeof writing. The U.S. Dollar and the Euro are resilient while Japanese Yen depreciated by 1.2% following BOJ lifting interest rate to 0-0.1% and exiting Yield Curve Control. Japanesebonds' carry differential vs. other developed markets' bonds are still negative.

US inflation came in higher than expected with February core inflation higher than expected. US economy remains resilient with the final Q4 GDP growth revised higher to 3.4%. S&PManufacturing and Services PMI were revised lower to 51.9 and 51.7, respectively, but still in the contraction zone. Labor market is resilient with March non-farm payrolls increased to330k, higher than consensus estimates. Disinflation trend continued in Europe with preliminary March headline inflation slowed to 2.4% and core inflation slowed to 2.9%. Manufacturing PMI came in higher than expected, although it's still in contraction zone. Services PMI improved to 51.5, higher than consensus estimates. Japan's final Q4 GDP growthshowed an expansion of 0.4%, compared to a preliminary reading indicating contraction. February inflation increased to 2.8%, in line with forecast. The 2024 Spring Wage Negotiationshowed strong wage growth, at 33-year high. Position: Reducing the gap between US and Europe allocation to Slight Overweight US funded by Slight Underweight Europe. While US economy remains resilient compared to Europe, growth styles have already performed well this year. There is a case for European equities to catch up as valuation remains cheap, PMI data is stabilizing, and investors lookfor diversification outside US and tech. Maintain Overweight Japan. Despite Japan experiencing some economic slowdown, there are increasing signs that inflation and wage increasesmay be sustainable in 2024. The 2024 Spring Wage Negotiation (Shunto) showed optimistic results with strong wage growth of 5.28% for headline and 3.7% for base pay for the firstrelease, a 33-year high. In response, the BOJ exited its Negative Interest Rate Policy and Yield Curve Control. Despite the policy change, the BOJ has indicated that they are going tokeep monetary policy accommodative to support economic recovery and to avoid any sudden increase in bond yields. Any future policy change is likely to be gradual. Sustainablenominal wage growth would lift household real income and support a virtuous cycle between wage and price increases. Despite short-term volatility in currency markets, Japan remainsattractive with corporate governance reforms and a virtuous cycle between wage and price increases as the key drivers.
