## PERFORMANCE RECORD

The Fund feeds into Affin Hwang Select Asia (ex Japan) Quantum Fund (“target fund”) with the objective of achieving capital appreciation over the medium to long-term by investing in Asia (ex Japan) equities with market capitalization of not more than USD1.5 billion at the time of investment. However, the target fund would also have an option to invest into companies with a market capitalization of not more than USD3.0 billion at the time of investment, which will be capped at no more than 30% of the Net Asset Value (NAV) of the target fund.

## FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

- US markets saw a strong rebound in January with the S&P 500 up 6.20% after a spate of 'Goldilocks' data showed US economic growth staying resilient and at the same time inflationary pressures easing. The tech-heavy Nasdaq gauge similarly soared 10.70%. This was supported by better-than-expected US 4Q'2022 GDP which fueled optimism that the US would be able to pull off a soft landing. Core personal consumption expenditures (PCE) which is the Fed's preferred inflation gauge also came below consensus which could give the Fed more latitude to ease up on rate hikes.
- The MSCI Asia ex-Japan climbed 8.2% lifted by tailwinds surrounding China's reopening. The MSCI China index closed up 12.3% in January as the country reopened its international borders for the first time after 3 years of COVID closures. With massive pent-up demand waiting to be unleashed, we could see a could strong uplift to growth as consumption returns.
- Other notable gainers in the region include Korea and Taiwan with the KOSPI index up 8.40% and Taiwan's weighted index vaulting by 8.00% respectively. A reversal in the US dollar strength has also propped-up emerging market as foreign fund flows return.
- Economic activities in China swung back to growth in January. The official purchasing managers' index rose to 50.1 from 47.0 in December with manufacturers firing up production again. Recovery in China continues to gain traction with recent travel and consumption data showing a sharp bounce during the Lunar holidays. A surge in spending was seen during the holiday period as travel restrictions in the country were loosened.
- India was the biggest underperformer as market sentiment was dampened by the collapse of Adani's share price. This follows a report by short seller Hindenburg Research containing allegations of stock manipulation and accounting fraud by the business conglomerate.

## STRATEGY:

- Growth and earnings are the biggest challenges for 2023. Asian markets are having a strong start to the year, aided by China's reopening, fund inflows and weaker USD. Markets may be due for a breather in the short term, though we see any weakness as a buying opportunity as we expect sustained tailwinds from China's reopening. US earnings expectation looks set to fall further. Valuation will need to come off more before the market looks attractive.
- We would continue to seek and hold stocks with the Quality Growth at Reasonable Price characteristic. These stocks offer an ideal balance of long term growth prospects, thematic relevance and digestible valuations, though there may be short-term headwinds.
- We continued to add into the Hong Kong / China market, including new additions such as a HK medical aesthetic provider, and a Chinese property manager. We have reduced weight in India given potential fallout from the Adani scandal. The Fund does not have exposure to any Adani Group companies or subsidiaries, nor to the state owned banks with loan exposure to Adani.
- The Fund's invested level was slightly increased to 92%, following the aforementioned additions. While we have made selective additions to the portfolio, we look to maintain some cash buffer.

This in turn may cause the NAV of the target fund or prices of units to fall.

### Currency risk
