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FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

For the month, the fund declined -1.37% in MYR terms, outperforming the benchmark by +199bps. The outperformance of the month was driven by Health care, Financials and Materials.

FBMKLCI lost 3.5% for the month. Inflation fears trumped the positive sentiment on reopening. Financials and Commodities gained, while Tech and Healthcare languished.

Malaysia's manufacturing PMI fell from 52.8pts in December to 50.5pts in January. The reading suggests the economy was still expanding. Following the January sell-off, the KLCI is once again looking attractive. The market now trades at a 2022F PE of 15.7x, falling to 14.6x in 2023F, a notable discount to its pre-Covid19 historical 10-year mean of 16.5x.

Investor sentiment remains dented by the one-off broad-based Prosperity Tax which hurts corporate earnings in 2022. We remain steadfast in our strategy to Overweight Financial and cyclical themes such as Consumer Discretionary, as well as Commodities. We may look to review Tech following the sell-off, reduce our Underweight on Plantation given the sustained strength in CPO prices.

Asia: The MSCI AC Asia Pacific ex Japan Index declined by 4% in USD terms in January, led by Korea and Australia, while Philippines was the best performing market. Concerns over tightening of monetary conditions in developed countries, and tensions between Russia and Ukraine, weighed on markets.

Inflation continued to print higher globally, with US inflation at 7%, India at 5.8% in Dec. Expectations of interest rate hike have been brought forward especially in developed markets such as the US, UK, and Australia. On the other hand, China has introduced more rate cuts and the Chinese government is likely to continue to roll out targeted measures to support growth. We maintain our view that fund flows are more likely to move to Asia since valuation is more attractive with relatively stronger earnings growth in 2022, compared to Developed markets.

We are cautiously optimistic about Asian equities over a 12-month horizon. Maintain focus on quality companies which are long term winners, or benefit from structural changes in their respective industries through market share gain. We also prefer companies with pricing power to overcome cost pressures, good earnings visibility and quality growth companies.

We aim to mitigate this risk by performing bottom-up and top-down credit research and analysis to determine the creditworthiness of its issuers or counterparties, and impose investment limits on exposures for issuers or counterparties with different credit profiles as a precautionary step to limit any loss that may arise directly or indirectly as a result of a defaulted transaction.
Interest rate risk	Interest rate risk refers to the impact of interest rate changes on the valuation of debt instruments and money market instruments. When interest rates rise, debt instruments and money market instruments prices generally decline and this may lower the market value of the target fund's investment in debt instruments and money market instruments. In managing the debt instruments, we take into account the coupon rate and time to maturity of the debt instruments with an aim to mitigate the interest rate risk. As for money market instruments, the typical tenor of these instruments are less than 12-month maturity and unlike debt instrument, any change to interest rate will only have a minor impact to the prices of these instruments.
Country risk	Investments of the target fund in any country may be affected by changes in the economic and political climate, restriction on currency repatriation or other developments in the law or regulations of the countries in which the target fund invests in. For example, the deteriorating economic condition of such countries may adversely affect the value of the investments undertaken by the target fund in those affected countries. This in turn may cause the NAV of the target fund or price of units to fall.
