## FUND MANAGER'S COMMENTS

- US markets tumbled in December capping off a turbulent 2022 as soaring inflation and tighter monetary policy jolted equities. The S&P 500 index ended 5.9% lower as the US Federal Reserve (Fed) delivered a 50 bps rate hike at its policy meeting last month, ending its 4 consecutive jumbo 75bps interest rate hike rates before.
- The KLCI edged 0.5% higher as the new unity government implemented several new policy measures. These include a decision by the government to reduce energy subsidies for high voltage users. Some of the affected industries include steel, cement and rubber. The move is expected to result in over RM5.0 billion in savings for the government as it rationalises its hefty subsidy bill.
- Other policy measures include a proposal by the Ministry of Communications and Digital to reduce the prices of services by telco companies. While the move is not yet confirmed, there is a risk that the government may embark on other more overzealous socialistic policies that comes at the expense of growth.
- Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim a list of deputy ministers for the unity government along with announcements of several measures including cutting special draws for number forecast operators, boosting egg supply via more imports, review of flood mitigation projects, and Breaking-up the rice monopoly.

### STRATEGY:

- The fund's invested levels were increased to around 81%, as we added exposure to companies with exposure to various commodities, as well as in the utilities sector. Meanwhile, we took profit on cyclical names and those we view have limited upside.
- We also raised positions in beneficiaries of China reopening, focusing on domestic demand, while reducing exposure in holdings that are at risk of ex-China slowdown and Malaysia policy risk. Overall, the Fund is still defensive positioning.
- Growth and earnings are the biggest challenges for 2023, hence we are not completely out of the woods. China's reopening is likely an offset for weak global growth. China will recover on the back of major shifts in key policies. Valuation is attractive but the recovery will take time.
- Meanwhile, US earnings expectation looks set to fall further. Valuation will need to come off more before the market looks attractive.
- We are positive on banks, which is a clear beneficiary of economic growth, coupled with strong outlook on loan growth and asset quality. We still like technology companies, where we see value emerging after the recent heavy selloff, and which has strong earnings visibility driven by secular growth trends (e.g. 5G, EV, solar energy).

For example, investment decisions undertaken by Affin Hwang as a result of an incorrect view of the market or any non-compliance with internal policies, investment mandate, the deed, relevant law or guidelines due to factors such as human error, fraudulence, dishonesty or weaknesses in operational process and systems, may adversely affect the performance of the target fund.
<b>Performance risk</b>	There is no guarantee in relation to the investment returns.
<b>Inflation risk</b>	This is the risk that your investment in the target fund may not grow or generate income at a rate that keeps pace with inflation. This would reduce your purchasing power even though the value of the investment in monetary terms has increased.
<b>Liquidity risk</b>	Liquidity risk arises in two scenarios. The first scenario is where the target fund's investment cannot be sold due to unavailability of a buyer for that investment. The second scenario exists where the target fund's investment, by its nature, is thinly traded. This will have the effect of causing the target fund's investment to be sold below its fair value which would adversely affect the NAV of the target fund.
<b>Credit/Default risk</b>	Credit risk relates to the creditworthiness of the issuers of the investment (Islamic money market instruments) and their expected ability to make timely payment of interest and/or principal. Any adverse situations faced by the issuers may impact the value as well as liquidity of the investment. In the case of rated investments, this may lead to a credit downgrade. Default risk relates to the risk of an issuer of the investment either defaulting on payments or failing to make payments in a timely manner which will in turn adversely affect the value of the investment. This could adversely affect the value of the target fund.
<b>Equity investment risk</b>	This is the risk associated with investing in a particular equity. The value of individual equity is mainly determined by its potential growth in earnings, sound management, and treatment of minority shareholders, as well as a myriad of other factors. Failure to achieve these would result in declining investment value which in turn affects the performance of the target fund. This can be mitigated by diversifying the target fund's portfolios.

**Reclassification of Shariah status risk**

This risk refers to the risk that the currently held Shariah-compliant securities by the target fund may be reclassified to be Shariah non-compliant in the periodic review of the equities by the Shariah Advisory Council of the Securities Commission Malaysia (SACSC), the Shariah Adviser for the target fund or the Shariah boards of the relevant Islamic indices.

If this occurs, Affin Hwang will take the necessary steps to dispose of such equities. There may be opportunity loss to the target fund due to the target fund not being allowed to retain the excess capital gains derived from the disposal of the Shariah non-compliant equities. Affin Hwang will be required to dispose of these equities immediately if the prices are above the purchase price. Should the prices be below the purchase price, Affin Hwang may choose to hold on to these holdings until the prices meet the purchase price. Nevertheless, should Affin Hwang decide to dispose of these equities below the purchase price, the target fund will be faced with the risk of realising its losses, thus negatively impacting the NAV of the target fund.

**Shariah-compliant warrants investment risk**

The value of the Shariah-compliant warrants (“warrants”) will depend on the pricing of the underlying security whereby the growth and performance prospect of the underlying security would consequentially affect the value of the warrants.
